#### **Public Education and Outreach**

The Village's Newsletter (Spring 2023) included an article about stormwater pollution, entitled "Only Rain Down the Drain". The newsletter also included information about yard waste and branch pick up dates. The newsletter was distributed to all residents and business owners within the Monee zip code (approximately 3,900 addresses). Excerpts from the Village's Spring 2022 newsletter have been enclosed with this report.

In addition to the printed newsletter, the Village has started to use Social Media to distribute information about Earth Day, garbage pick up, etc.

The Village held its annual Earth Day event on April 17, 2023. Flyers and other handouts are included in this report.

In order to satisfy the permit requirement regarding environmental justice, online resources were reviewed, and a summary is included with this report.

Recycling and trash pickup continue by Republic Services and is available to all residents in the Village. Yard waste is picked up by Republic Services every Friday between April 1<sup>st</sup> and November 30<sup>th</sup>. Information regarding yard waste and recycling from the Village's website have been enclosed with this report, as well as an accepted materials flyer from Republic Services.

Information regarding monthly electronics recycling through Will County Green from the Village's website has been enclosed with this report.

As part of this program, the language of these current codes will be evaluated for applicability and effectiveness under the NPDES program.

**8. C3: DETECTION/ELIMINATION PRIORITIZATION PLAN**

The Village did not find any illicit discharges within the last reporting cycle. In the event that an illicit discharge is discovered, the Village will utilize the CWP Guidance Manual to expedite elimination of the illicit discharge.

**9. C4: ILLICIT DISCHARGE TRACING PROCEDURES**

The Village investigated one suspected illicit discharge, due to a spill, within the last reporting cycle, but testing of samples did not show any gross contamination. In the event that an illicit discharge is discovered, the Village utilizes the CWP Guidance Manual to investigate.

**10. C5: ILLICIT SOURCE REMOVAL PROCEDURES**

The Village did not find any illicit discharges within the last reporting cycle. In the event that an illicit discharge is discovered, the Village will utilize the CWP Guidance Manual to expedite elimination of the illicit discharge.

**11. C7: VISUAL DRY WEATHER SCREENING**

The Village has prepared a map designating locations of major/high priority outfalls and stream monitoring. These locations can be seen in the map associated with Section C1.

Outfall inspections were completed (three locations attached) and will be completed on an annual basis in future years to detect any potential non-stormwater discharges and illegal dumping.

Stream monitoring for 3 locations occurred this year with additional anticipated next year.

Since the Village population is under 25,000, visual monitoring of its upstream and downstream watercourse locations will suffice.

As part of this program, the language of these current codes will be evaluated for applicability and effectiveness under the NPDES program.

**13. D2: EROSION AND SEDIMENT CONTROL BMPs**

The Village enforces installation and maintenance of erosion and sediment control BMPs for construction projects. Current site photos from the Industrial Drive project are included as an example to show that the site has reached a point of stabilization. A copy of the Will-South Cook Soil and Water Conservation District Soil Erosion/Sediment Control Field Observation Report is included also.

**14. D4: SITE PLAN REVIEW PROCEDURES**

Development projects are reviewed under local and state ordinances by Village Staff and engineering consultants, especially regarding erosion and sediment control measures. Projects over one acre are required to obtain a Notice of Intent prior to construction. The Village did not have any new projects start within the current reporting cycle. Two sample review letters for industrial development projects (Seefried and Ridgeland Industrial Lots 4 and 5).

**15. D6: SITE INSPECTION/ENFORCEMENT PROCEDURES**

The Village enforces the required periodic inspections of projects greater than one acre. A sample inspection report is included (performed by the owner/developer as well as performed by a Village representative).

**16. E6: POST-CONSTRUCTION INSPECTIONS**

Village Staff regularly performs inspections of major stormwater facilities to observe needs for maintenance and repairs with intent of improving stormwater quality. Formal documentation will commence this year to document the inspections.

## **Pollution Prevention and Good Housekeeping**

### **17. F1: EMPLOYEE TRAINING PROGRAM**

Employee Training has occurred within the Public Works Department from time to time on a variety of topics that pertain to stormwater quality, awareness and documentation.

### **18. F2: INSPECTION AND MAINTENANCE PROGRAM**

Routine maintenance of Village streets, storm sewer, ditches, and stormwater facilities is part of the Public Works responsibilities. This includes sweeping, vacuuming, jetting, repair, debris and branch collection, etc.

### **19. F3 & F4: MUNICIPAL OPERATIONS STORM WATER CONTROL & WASTE DISPOSAL**

Deicing materials and vehicles are stored in a permanent structure. All fertilizers, pesticides, and other chemicals are stored indoors.

### **20. F5: FLOOD MANAGEMENT/ASSESS GUIDELINES**

The Village has various ordinances in place for flood management (as listed earlier in this report). These ordinances are enforced on all Village and non-Village projects as applicable.

### **21. F6: OTHER MUNICIPAL OPERATIONS CONTROL**

The Village is in the planning process for a new public works site located on Industrial Drive; a SWPPP will be developed at such time the site is constructed and in operation.

Village Garbage is collected weekly from approximately 2050 residences in covered cans which helps to reduce the debris and pollution in waterways. A contract was prepared ±9 year ago which includes collection of municipal solid waste, yard waste, and recyclable materials from covered carts.

Village Staff also cleans up dumped materials as part of regular tasks and workload.

In addition, the Village also relies on the Will County Green program to collect electronics and hazardous waste. Information regarding monthly electronics recycling through the Will County Green program from the Village's website has been enclosed with this report and was previously discussed in BMP B7. Information regarding electronics and household hazardous materials collection through the Will County Green program from Will County Green's website has been enclosed with this report.

The Illinois Integrated Water Quality Report has been evaluated for TMDL status in each watershed within the corporate limits as part of the Notice of Intent preparation and submittal in February 2021.

No monitoring data has been collected, as it is not required for the Village of Monee.






School has returned. Buses and kids walking to and from. You know the drill. Drive like that's your kids out there. We will be in the area, and that is probably the type of ticket you don't want on your record. Be Smart!

Unfortunately, violence against our children has been at the forefront of the news. Shootings in and around schools should not be common place! We will pay extra attention to anything involving the schools this year. We have met with school officials and we are in this together. Diligence and preparation will not be ignored. All the area departments are on the same page and we are all supporting each other. Just like everything else, if somebody says something or does something, don't hesitate to call. It seems like there are always warning signs. Let us figure it out before it's too late!!

Did you ever wonder why people steal catalytic converters? Obviously, it has to have value, or they wouldn't steal it. It's called platinum, rhodium and palladium. Here are some of the exciting projects that I have been involved with over the past several months, along with key projects:

- 1. Voortman Steel** – Located in Monee for 7 years is an international manufacturer with the only manufacturing facility based in The Netherlands. ## BUILDING SERVICES

### On behalf of all of us at the Building Services Department:

# PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

## Water Main Flushing: Coming to a fire hydrant near you October 7, 2022!

During the week of October 7-11, Monee's Public Works Department will perform a final flush of the Village's water mains before the chill of winter sets in. This will be a shorter version of our spring flush, which will focus primarily on low demand areas. Here are a few tips to remember...

- **PLEASE WATCH FOR SIGNS POSTED IN YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD.** Areas scheduled for flushing will have signs posted at least 24 hours in advance to inform residents.
- During and after flushing, if you encounter discolored water, please open a cold water tap and let the water run for 5 minutes. If the water does not run clear after 5 minutes, shut the water off, wait 30-45 minutes and repeat. Do not run water constantly for hours, as this is wasteful and ineffective.
- If possible, avoid running hot water taps while the water is discolored. This will help keep sediment from settling in your water heater.
- To avoid staining, do not wash clothes when flushing is occurring in your area, or any time water is discolored.

## Winter Tips to Help Our Community Work Together

The winter snow can offer ample opportunities for recreational activities but many of us see it as a tiresome chore that rarely comes at a convenient time. This is further complicated by the Village's commitment to keeping the streets as clear and safe as possible. With a little insight and useful tips you can minimize the frustrations and stay warm (or enjoying the recreational aspects of winter).

- Keep our children safe. Please keep in mind plow drivers often cannot see children on the plow hills. We know they look fun but they can cause serious injuries or even a fatality. Educating our children where to safely play in snow is best. Also keep in mind our children walk to bus stops and even to school. Please help shovel our sidewalks and bus corners.
- Helping to shovel our neighbor's sidewalks increases our safety for all residents, from the elderly to our children.
- Avoid walking on the streets. With the snowy conditions, vehicles and especially plows have inherently limited visibility and pedestrians in the street are just encouraging needless hazards.
- Avoid placing your garbage cans in the street when plows are out.
- Avoid placing your snow to the west side of your driveway will minimize potential drifting in your drive, since the wind typically out of the west.
- Do not shovel snow onto the street. Actually clearing the snow along the curb up the street will reduce the snow being pushed by the plow and minimize the amount deposited at end of your driveway.
- Your mail carrier will also appreciate if keep your mailbox accessible

## Snow and Your Mailbox

Regrettably, in extreme winter conditions, mailboxes can be damaged during snow removal because they are installed close to the road in the highway right-of-way as a courtesy to the US Postal Service. In most cases, damage to mailboxes is a result of the force of snow coming off a plow's blade. This scenario is dependent on weather conditions, amount of snowfall, and the weight of snow. At times, the Village or private contractor's plow will accidentally hit and damage a mailbox. This is an unfortunate consequence of snow removal with heavy equipment in challenging weather conditions

How can you determine how your mailbox was damaged? Typically, if a mailbox is pushed over and has no impact marks, it was probably knocked over by the weight of snow coming off a plow's blade. If the mailbox or post shows evidence of an impact, it may have been struck by a Town or private contractor plow blade or a passing vehicle. The angle at which a mailbox has fallen also helps to determine the source of damage.

If a mailbox is damaged from snow coming off a plow blade, the Village will not replace the mailbox. In case of an emergency, we have a limited amount of temp mail boxes you can use until your mail box can be fixed. If your mail box is down, please contact the public works department at 708-534-8306.

Taking time to prepare your mailbox for winter now can prevent serious headaches later. If your mailbox moves when shaken, it could be knocked over by snow thrown off the road by a passing snowplow. Residents should prepare mailboxes for winter by tightening screws and ensuring the post and receptacle are secure enough to endure large amounts of thrown snow. If a private contractor plows your driveway, we recommend that you learn their policies regarding damage to your (or your neighbor's) property caused by their operators or equipment.

# PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

## Snow Removal

There are 70.2 miles of road in Monee. Each road can take 2-4 passes to completely plow. Snow conditions affect plowing and salting time. Operators strive to get the roads to a safe drivable condition as soon as they can. The Village of Monee's policy is to have major arterial roads plowed within 12 hours after a major storm, secondary collector roads plowed within 24 hours, and residential streets plowed within 36 hours. The school bus routes are done first, followed by the steepest roads and connector roads. Side streets, flat roads and cul-de-sacs are done last, unless they form part of completing a route in the most efficient, cost effective and time - saving way. One way to assist the Village in snow removal from streets is to have your vehicle parked in your driveway so the snow plows do not have to go around the vehicles on the street. Please keep in mind that parking vehicles on the street during a snow event is a violation of local ordinances, and that citations will be issued to violators.

### **Cleaning village streets is no easy task, and requires strategic coordination in order to:**

- Keep the main roads clear for emergency vehicles
- Clear subdivisions streets (especially the naturally problematic cul-de-sac)
- Supplement state and county maintained routes
- Work around residents that leave cars on streets or throw snow onto the streets, which is an issue of public safety, and contributes to unnecessary delays and costs to all taxpayers. (These are violations of local code).
- Minimize overtime and overworking of our public workers and equipment (which is complicated by prolonged snow fall, drifting snow, and sub -zero temperatures).



## Snow Plows and Driving

**When the snow does come, please allow for extra drive time. Clear all snow from your vehicle including headlights and taillights. Give plow operators plenty of room to do their job for you. Don't try to race a plow or make quick moves to "get away." Cars are not always visible and big trucks cannot always stop quickly to respond to sudden moves by cars. Please be smart and safe this winter.**

# EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY

## What do we do?

We get asked this question often and it's not a quick answer because our agency covers a broad spectrum. The Emergency Management agency is tasked to develop, coordinate and promote a comprehensive Emergency Management Program. This program will incorporate planning, preparedness, response, and recovery activities to emergencies or disasters weather natural or man-made. We are liaisons and collaborate with local, state and federal agencies, profit and non-profit institutions and volunteer organizations, as well as activities related to the establishment of a comprehensive Emergency Management Program.



### **The Emergency Management Agency duties include:**

- Develop and maintain the Village's Emergency Operation Plan a framework for the coordinated of emergency response across a broad spectrum of discipline and agencies.
- Develop and maintain emergency communication and warning equipment
- Promotion of mitigation activities, prevent and prepare before disaster happens
- Traffic control
- Emergency lighting
- Emergency power
- Severe weather spotting and weather support and notification
- Public education and information
- Event safety

## Salt Brine Fact Sheet

Frequently asked questions regarding the Village's use of salt brine to enhance road safety, while minimizing cost and environmental impact.

### What is salt brine?

Salt brine is a solution of salt (typically sodium chloride) and water. It has a freezing point lower than pure water and, as such, is a useful tool in reducing the adhesion of snow and ice to road surfaces. In addition to brine made with sodium chloride, some winter maintenance agencies also use brines made with calcium chloride or magnesium chloride. Nonetheless, these brines are solutions of salt and water, with a freezing point lower than the freezing point of pure water. The freezing point of brine is a function of the salt being used in the brine (sodium chloride, calcium chloride, or magnesium chloride) and the percentage by weight of that salt in the solution.



### Why is salt brine important?

Rock salt, or solid salt, is simply crystals of sodium chloride. Until it has gone into solution—that is, until it has formed brine—it will do nothing to stop snow from freezing to the pavement surface. Agencies that use rock salt in their winter maintenance activities are doing so to create brine on the road surface. Therefore, brine is an integral and critical part of winter maintenance activities.

### What is the difference between anti-icing and deicing?

Anti-icing is a proactive approach taken to decrease the likelihood of snow and ice bonding to a pavement surface. Additionally, anti-icing can prevent frost from forming on pavement surfaces. Anti-icing involves placing a layer of brine on the surface of the pavement before a winter storm has begun. This layer prevents the snow and ice from freezing to (or icing onto) the road. The alternative—which is called deicing—is to let the snow bond/freeze to the road, then apply pre-wetted rock salt to break the bond between the snow and the pavement.

Studies have shown that anti-icing will achieve the same level of service on a road or highway using between one-quarter and one-fifth the amount of salt used in deicing. Typically, anti-icing is performed using trucks carrying tanks, which have pumps to spray the brine onto the pavement surfaces. In many places lines or stripes of brine can be seen on a road before a given event. Some people call these safety stripes! Usually, brine is applied at rates of between 30 and 50 gallons per lane mile.

### Are all those liquids pure salt brine?

No, they are not. Increasingly, agencies are blending brines to take into account the particular storm conditions they expect to deal with. Blends often use by-products from a variety of processes applied to natural materials. Organics might include by-products from cheese whey and sugar beet or similar ingredients. The purpose of organics is to increase the longevity of the brine on the pavement surface. Evidence has been presented that organics may reduce corrosion of vehicles and infrastructure. Usually, the concentration of organic additives in brine ranges from 5 to 20 percent. One typical mixture is 85% salt brine, 5% calcium chloride brine, and 10% organic.

### What is pre-wetting, and where does it fit into all of this?

As discussed above, rock salt does not reduce the freezing temperature of the pavement surface until it has created a brine. Rock salt is typically pre-wetted while it is being applied to the pavement surface. Rock salt can be pre-wetted in many ways. The general idea is to get the

rock salt wet as it leaves the plow truck. This not only jump-starts the freezing temperature reduction process (and thus gets the salt “working” more quickly) but it also helps the rock salt stay on the road after it is spread. When rock salt is not pre-wet, as much as 30% may end up bouncing straight into the ditch or gutter. Pre-wetting is normally done at rates of around 8-10 gallons of brine per ton of solid material, but some agencies are now working on using slurries of rock salt, which has as much as 50 gallons of brine per ton of solid material.

### What about corrosion, isn't brine more corrosive than rock salt?

As previously noted, if an agency is using rock salt to its best advantage, it is employing brine. So, rock salt and brine are just two sides of the same coin. That said, yes, chlorides can cause corrosion in metals, and if not treated properly this can cause damage to vehicles and infrastructure. Some organic additives may have corrosion-resistant benefits. Certainly, laboratory studies show that some of the organics reduce corrosion substantially. However, the best way to reduce or avoid corrosion is to take the extra precaution of rinsing off any residue from the road salt or the brine the road salt has become.

### So, does putting down a liquid on a cold road just freeze to the road?

Brine does have a lot of water in it. For example, sodium chloride brine is typically 23.3% sodium chloride when it is applied. That means that it is 76.7% water. But, the salt is in a solution in the water, and that solution has a lower freezing point than pure water, as noted earlier. In particular, when salt brine is applied at a 23.3% concentration, it will freeze (without any additional dilution) at about -6° F. Unless the road surface is extremely cold, the brine will not freeze to the road. Of course, as it melts snow and ice, it becomes more diluted and—unless additional treatments are made or the road is cleared of snow and ice by plowing—the road will refreeze eventually. But the short answer to this question is NO – the brine will not freeze on the road when it is applied.

### So, the brine won't freeze, but will it make the road slippery some other way?

There have been concerns about this slippery issue since the early days of using brines in the US. Indeed, AASHTO (the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials) considered this issue back in the 1990s. They concluded there might be an issue of slipperiness with some brines, but it would only occur in very unusual circumstances. These circumstances could be avoided by simply not applying brine when pavement temperatures were warm, or when the air humidity fell within certain ranges. Provided those restrictions are followed, brines do not cause slippery roads at all—rather they enhance road safety and mobility during winter weather and are a clear benefit to the traveling public.








Monee Township has entered into an agreement with Will County Will Ride, through PACE Bus Company, for Transportation services.





## Only Rain Down the Drain

**Understanding where storm sewer pollution comes from and what you can do to help our community have a better environment.**

When the rain or water hits hard surfaces, like pavement, it creates storm water run-off. The runoff picks up lots of nasty pollution as it is carried directly through the gutters and drains out to the rivers, streams, and lakes making them toxic and unsafe for people and animals. The pollution is typically not treated or removed from the water on its journey, so it's up to us to keep it clean and fresh from the start. Here are some things we can all do to minimize storm water pollution and keep our community looking and feeling great.

**Step 1:** Maintain your car or truck. Never dump any chemicals from these vehicles down a storm drain. Always recycle used oil, antifreeze and other fluids. Fixing leaks on your vehicle will minimize run-off during rain or watering events.

**Step 2:** Wash your vehicle at a commercial car wash rather than in the street or in your driveway. These types of facilities typically will contain storm or sanitary basins designed to minimize chemical run-off. If you prefer to wash at home, do so in a grassy area so soaps and cleaners can collect locally on site and not down a storm drain.

**Step 3:** Drive less. Leave your car at home at least one day each week and take a bus, carpool or bike to work. Combine errands when you drive. Get your vehicle emissions system checked. Buy a low emissions vehicle to reduce pollutants.

**Step 4:** Cut down on fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides. If you use these chemicals, follow the label directions and use them sparingly. Don't fertilize before a rainstorm. Consider using an organic type fertilizer. Compost or mulch lawn clippings. Preserve existing trees or plant new ones—trees hold rainfall and help manage storm water.

**Step 5:** Pick up after your pets. Scoop your dog's poop and properly dispose of it.

**Step 6:** Reduce impervious surfaces at home and increase the vegetated land cover on your property. Reduce your rooftop runoff by directing your gutter downspouts to vegetated areas and not directly into the storm drain on your street. For your driveway and patios, consider putting in a permeable paving brick or patterns of cement and brick that allow rain water to filter through it.

If each of us can make some small adjustments in our daily routines now, then together we can insure our water and environment stay clean and healthy for generations to come.



## Prevention of the Mosquito

With the winters becoming milder, we can only expect the mosquito population will be high. Taking proper precautions are necessary to reduce the reproduction of the larvae. Standing water left to sit out can give rise to hundreds mosquitoes in a matter of days. To prevent your homes from pesky mosquitoes, take the time to clear the following from standing water.

- Empty buckets, old tires or any containers that hold water.
- Clean out your gutters of debris and standing water.
- Change outdoor water dishes daily
- Rinse and scrub vases and other outdoor water containers such as bird baths and wading pools
- Always maintain your pools and hot tubs
- Cover your trash containers



If mosquito problem persist, consider pesticide applications for yards and vegetation around the home. When standing water cannot be drained and water will be present for more than a couple of days, treat standing water with larvicide such as mosquito "dunks". In addition to Mosquito Control strategies, the best way to avoid infection is to prevent mosquito's bites from happening. Individuals can protect themselves by wearing insect repellent, wearing long sleeves and pants. Keep in mind mosquitoes are typically more active during dusk, but they can be present and active at all times of the day.

The Village of Monee has partnered with Will County Dept. of public Health and the IL. Dept. Of Public Health as a mosquito monitoring and reporting location for South / East Will County where we monitor mosquito activity at four different locations throughout the village limits. We have 4 licensed (Dept. of Agriculture) public applicators working for the village who collect samples, distribute larviciding product and who adulticide (spray) in the Village limits. They attend numerous training events throughout the year and are in constant communication with the WCHD & IDPH.

Monee larvicide's approximately 978 known catch basis through the village limits. We ground adulticide (spray) when mosquito activity is at its peak around dusk. We do not spray west of I-57 due to conflicts of beekeepers. The spray can be harmful to the bees. The Village of Monee will post on our Facebook page when spraying.

#### Waterways. Yuck.

- If untreated sewage backs up into streets, it has a chance to enter our storm drains and waterways.
- Untreated sewage is a dangerous pollutant because it causes sudden increases in nitrogen and bacteria. High levels of nitrogen and bacteria result in declines to local aquatic life (like plants, fish and crabs), beach closures and health warnings on local seafood consumption.

## Maintaining Our Ponds

Ponds and water features are valuable assets to any property owner. Left unmanaged, they can significantly detract from the true value of the property. Stagnant, nutrient waters can lead to excessive aquatic vegetation. The Village of Monee has a Marine Biochemist that specializes in aquatic management, that has been in business for over 45 years to come out and treat our ponds every year. With Marine Biochemists and homeowners we can work together to keep our ponds healthy for the vegetation and wild life. Following these steps as homeowners and can make a huge difference in our environment:

- Limit the amount of fertilizers used throughout the property. Over use of fertilizer can have a run off effect in to our ponds. The health of a water body is determined largely by the amounts of nutrients found in the system. Nutrients act as food for fish, birds, plants and algae. But too much of a nutrient level can create a nuisance.
- Do not add your own aquarium plants into the ponds. Exotic and nuisance aquatic plant growth can further unbalance the water. These organisms tend to quickly dominate the areas where they grow, increase sedimentation and interrupt the normal cycles of the ponds.

*Taking these steps, we can all enjoy our ponds in the Village of Monee.*

## Salt Brine Fact Sheet

Frequently asked questions regarding the Village's use of salt brine to enhance road safety, while minimizing cost and environmental impact.

### What is salt brine?

Salt brine is a solution of salt (typically sodium chloride) and water. It has a freezing point lower than pure water and, as such, is a useful tool in reducing the adhesion of snow and ice to road surfaces. In addition to brine made with sodium chloride, some winter maintenance agencies also use brines made with calcium chloride or magnesium chloride. Nonetheless, these brines are solutions of salt and water, with a freezing point lower than the freezing point of pure water. The freezing point of brine is a function of the salt being used in the brine (sodium chloride, calcium chloride, or magnesium chloride) and the percentage by weight of that salt in the solution.

### Why is salt brine important?

Rock salt, or solid salt, is simply crystals of sodium chloride. Until it has gone into solution—that is, until it has formed brine—it will do nothing to stop snow from freezing to the pavement surface. Agencies that use rock salt in their winter maintenance activities are doing so to create brine on the road surface. Therefore, brine is an integral and critical part of winter maintenance activities.

### What is the difference between anti-icing and deicing?

Anti-icing is a proactive approach taken to decrease the likelihood of snow and ice bonding to a pavement surface. Additionally, anti-icing can prevent frost from forming on pavement surfaces. Anti-icing involves placing a layer of brine on the surface of the pavement before a winter storm has begun. This layer prevents the snow and ice from freezing to (or icing onto) the road. The alternative—which is called deicing—is to let the snow bond/freeze to the road, then apply pre-wetted rock salt to break the bond between the snow and the pavement.

Studies have shown that anti-icing will achieve the same level of service on a road or highway using between one-quarter and one-fifth the amount of salt used in deicing. Typically, anti-icing is performed using trucks carrying tanks, which have pumps to spray the brine onto the pavement surfaces. In many places lines or stripes of brine can be seen on a road before a given event. Some people call these safety stripes! Usually, brine is applied at rates of between 30 and 50 gallons per lane mile.

### Are all those liquids pure salt brine?

No, they are not. Increasingly, agencies are blending brines to take into account the particular storm conditions they expect to deal with



### What is pre-wetting, and where does it fit into all of this?

As discussed above, rock salt does not reduce the freezing temperature of the pavement surface until it has created a brine. Rock salt is typically pre-wetted while it is being applied to the pavement surface. Rock salt can be pre-wetted in many ways. The general idea is to get the

rock salt wet as it leaves the plow truck. This not only jump-starts the freezing temperature reduction process (and thus gets the salt "working" more quickly) but it also helps the rock salt stay on the road after it is spread. When rock salt is not pre-wet, as much as 30% may end up bouncing straight into the ditch or gutter. Pre-wetting is normally done at rates of around 8-10 gallons of brine per ton of solid material, but some agencies are now working on using slurries of rock salt, which has as much as 50 gallons of brine per ton of solid material.

### What about corrosion, isn't brine more corrosive than rock salt?

As previously noted, if an agency is using rock salt to its best advantage, it is employing brine. So, rock salt and brine are just two sides of the same coin. That said, yes, chlorides can cause corrosion in metals, and if not treated properly this can cause damage to vehicles and infrastructure. Some organic additives may have corrosion-resistant benefits. Certainly, laboratory studies show that some of the organics reduce corrosion substantially. However, the best way to reduce or avoid corrosion is to take the extra precaution of rinsing off any residue from the road salt or the brine the road salt has become.

### So, does putting down a liquid on a cold road just freeze to the road?

Brine does have a lot of water in it. For example, sodium chloride brine is typically 23.3% sodium chloride when it is applied. That means that it is 76.7% water. But, the salt is in a solution in the water, and that solution has a lower freezing point than pure water, as noted earlier. In particular, when salt brine is applied at a 23.3% concentration, it will freeze (without any additional dilution) at about -6° F. Unless the road surface is extremely cold, the brine will not freeze to the road. Of course, as it melts snow and ice, it becomes more diluted and—unless additional treatments are made or the road is cleared of snow and ice by plowing—the road will refreeze eventually. But the short answer to this question is NO – the brine will not freeze on the road when it is applied.

### So, the brine won't freeze, but will it make the road slippery some other way?

There have been concerns about this slippery issue since the early

## Yard Waste & Branch Pickups

**Republic Yard Waste Service are on your garbage day starting on April 1st.**

Yard waste can be placed in either brown kraft paper bags or in your own containers marked with yard waste stickers which can be obtained at no charge by calling customer service at 708-385-8252 or at the Village Hall.

The containers cannot exceed 35 gallons in size, or 40 pounds in weight. Please Note: Tree branches in excess of two inches in diameter will not be removed. Tree branches must be bundled in a maximum 2 feet in diameter and 4 feet in length and should weigh no more than 40 pounds. Yard waste in plastic bags is not acceptable.

Please have your branches curb side ready for pick up prior to the dates posted here.

All dates are weather permitted. Please note: We do not chip root balls or dirt. Please have these items disposed of properly. We also will not chip trees that have been contracted out for removal.



## Hydrant Flushing

Spring is here once again and with it comes our annual spring water main flushing. Our process will be much the same as it has been in recent years, flushing water mains throughout



As directed, we have performed a review of the Engineering Plans (dated 09/23/22) prepared by SPACECCO, Inc. for the referenced project and find them to be in substantial compliance with Village design standards.

**Notes/Conditions:**

1. Approvals from outside agencies are the responsibility of the owner and/or owner's engineer. A copy of all outstanding permits and/or approvals including IEPA Water, IEPA Sanitary, Aqua Illinois (for sanitary sewer), and Monee Fire Protection District shall be provided.
2. Four final sets of fully executed improvement plans signed and sealed by the PE in charge shall be provided to the Village.
3. It will be the developer's responsibility to perform or have performed the erosion control inspections required by the IEPA. The inspection reports should be provided to the Village on a monthly basis. The Contractor Certification should be signed (by each contractor working on the project) as well as the Owner SWPPP Certification. A copy of each should be kept on-site and also sent to the Village. (Refer to Plan Sheet 25 for a sample of the Certifications.)
4. Monee Township approval should be obtained for the improvements along Ridgeland Avenue north of the Village limits (north property line extended).
5. A Plat of Easement should be provided to cover the proposed water main, sanitary sewer, detention facilities, etc. accordingly. Please note that an easement should be provided to allow future installation of watermain from the proposed north-south water main west of the building to the west property line just north of the proposed sanitary. The north limits of the easement should be at least to the curb line of the east-west curb line of the adjacent parking stalls.
6. The project guarantee amount to be provided to the Village shall be **\$1,858,958.20** (110% of the Engineer's Opinion of Probable Cost of Construction received 10/04/22).
7. Record Drawings signed and sealed by a professional engineer or professional land surveyor shall be submitted for all public utilities (including street lights) per Section 12-4-3 of the Monee Village Code (Village Code) as well as detention related improvements upon completion of construction. CAD files should also be forwarded.

8. Street lighting calculations shall be provided for review to verify that the street lighting design (number of lights, spacing, photometrics, etc.) follows Table 3 (Lighting Design Criteria for Streets) from the Illuminating Engineering Society (IES) RP-8-14 Guide for Sampson Street and Ridgeland Avenue. Galvanized steel conduit should be used under streets or commercial driveways. Also, the proposed lighting controller location and design should be such that it can accommodate a future lighting system along Carl Street (future N-S roadway that will extend to Monee-Manhattan Road). The applicant should confirm the proposed location and future expansion capacity via voltage drop calculations. We understand that the lighting calculations will be provided by the electrical design build contractor.
9. A photometric plan should be provided for the on-site area. We understand that this will be provided by the electrical design build contractor.
10. A landscaping plan for the site should be submitted to the Village Building Department for review. Please note that the plantings on the proposed berm between the east parking area and the detention facility to screen the parking lot from Ridgeland Avenue will be critical. The design engineer indicated that a site landscaping plan will be submitted to the Village with the Building Permit application.
11. The Village will require that the existing overhead utilities along Ridgeland Avenue be relocated underground. The applicant has acknowledged that they agree to relocate these utilities.
12. Permission/approval from the appropriate pipeline companies with easement rights to the 80' easement along the north property line should be provided for the proposed Ridgeland Avenue improvements within the easement.
13. The applicant should refer to Section 11-10-2-A of the ordinance that pertains to noise requirements which should be met. Seefried has indicated that a report will be submitted from an acoustics engineer accordingly.

As directed, we have performed a review of the Site Improvement Plans (dated 01/12/23) for the referenced project. The original stormwater management ordinance (Appendix D), original Ridgeland Industrial Park Engineering Plans, and Drainage Feasibility Study (dated 02/12/18) have been enclosed for reference. Specifically, we offer the following comments:

General

1. The project will disturb an area greater than one (1) acre and an ILR10 permit will be required from the IEPA. No construction activities shall begin prior to receipt of an IEPA approval date as posted on the IEPA website. *Also, it will be the developer's responsibility to perform or have performed the erosion control inspections required by the IEPA. The inspection reports should be provided to the Village on a monthly basis.* The Contractor Certification should be signed (by each contractor) as well as the Owner SWPPP Certification should be signed accordingly and sent to the Village prior to earthwork activities.
2. Permits and/or approvals should be obtained accordingly from Aqua Illinois and IEPA as necessary for the proposed sanitary sewer improvements. Please note that our office did not review the proposed sanitary sewer improvements, as they are under the jurisdiction of Aqua Illinois. Please also note that it has been our experience that Aqua will require an inspection manhole for each service and information pertaining to the type of sanitary wastes discharged from the proposed buildings.
3. Approval from the Monee Fire Protection District shall be forwarded to the Village upon receipt.
4. A Plat of Survey should be submitted. (Please note stormwater easements will be required over the detention facility if not previously provided.)
5. Engineering plans and drainage calculations should be signed and sealed by professional engineer in the State of Illinois. The Drainage Certification on the coversheet should also be signed accordingly as well.
6. An Engineer's Opinion of Probable Cost of Construction (EOPCC) shall be provided for costs associated with the sediment and erosion control items as well as site detention improvements for the entire project so that the project guarantee amount can be established per the Village of Monee Stormwater Management Ordinance (VMSMO). EOPCC shall also include items associated with all public infrastructure improvements being constructed as part of the development. The guarantee shall be in the amount equal to 110% of the EOPCC amount.

7. Record Drawings signed and sealed by a professional engineer or professional land surveyor shall be submitted for all public utilities per Section 12-4-3 of the Monee Village Code (Village Code) as well as detention related improvements upon completion of construction. CAD files should also be forwarded.
8. A photometric plan should be provided for the on-site area.
9. A landscaping plan for the site should be submitted to the Village Building Department for review.
10. The site soils report should be forwarded to the Village for its files.
11. Permission should be provided by the owner of Lot 3 to allow the construction of the proposed off-site bypass pipe.

Geometric and Paving Plan – Plan Sheet C3

12. Please provide calculations for the required and provided number of regular and handicapped parking stalls and show on Sheet C3. (Refer to Village's ordinance Section 11-11-4).
13. Do the disabled parking spaces have an accessible route to a building entrance? The accessible route (and grading) should be demonstrated accordingly.
14. Per the Village's ordinance section 11-11-2(G), required parking spaces should be at least 20' in length.
15. On Sheet C3, note that the parking space markings (and other markings such as the hashed markings behind the buildings) are such, and where the handicapped parking signs will be located.
16. The minimum IDOT thickness for HMA Binder is 2 ¼" (Refer to Section 406.06-e of the IDOT Standard Specifications for Road and Bridge Construction). Depending upon the final use, the applicant may want to consider further increasing the pavement section accordingly.
17. It should be verified if existing easements or agreements are in place to allow ingress/egress to Lots 4 and 5 from Ridgeland Avenue.

SWPP Plan – Plan Sheet C4

18. A stabilized construction entrance detail is included on this sheet, but no stabilized construction entrance is shown on the plans. The footprint of the entrance should be shown on the plans.
19. Properly sized rip rap should be provided at the curb depression where flows will enter the detention facility.

Grading and Utility Plan – Plan Sheet C5

20. Detention shall be provided for the proposed improvements that meets the current ordinance. Please note that the total site detention volume to be provided shall include the detention volume required per the old Village ordinance (which was in place at the time of the initial Ridgeland Industrial Park development) for the existing western portion of the Ridgeland Industrial development plus the detention volume required per the current Village ordinance for Lots 4 and 5. (Please also note that the Village has previously been provided information that the existing detention facility was not constructed large enough to provide the original detention volume required at the time of development in ±2002.) As previously noted, the original stormwater ordinance (Appendix D) has been enclosed for reference. The current stormwater ordinance is available on the Village website.
21. We would suggest that the storm sewers be cleaned and televised, since they have been in the ground for approximately 20 years on a vacant site.
22. The proposed water service shall meet the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) requirements. The domestic water service should connect to the fire service line inside the building, be routed outside the building with a b-box, and then routed back inside the building. An easement or access agreement should be provided to allow Village access to the b-box.

23. The buried sanitary manhole at the southeast corner of the site needs to be excavated and adjusted to grade.
24. Easements for emergency maintenance are needed for the proposed storm sewer and overland flood routes if not previously provided. It is also important that an easement is provided near the south end of the proposed 24" bypass storm sewer to allow access for a future detention facility outlet associated with the property to the south.
25. It's recommended that a low flow concrete channel or other provisions be incorporated with the existing detention facility improvements to address flows that may be associated with drawdown of future off-site detention facilities to the south.
26. The 24" bypass storm sewer proposed to drain south offsite flow under the pavement and into the detention basin will have less than a 2-year storm capacity. Note that with this size of storm sewer, flows will continue over the pavement here fairly frequently. A copy of a Drainage Feasibility Study (dated 02/12/18) prepared by Robinson Engineering is enclosed for reference that shows bypass pipe sizing for various storm events. Drainage calculations for the proposed storm sewer improvements shall be provided.
27. A note should be added to the engineering plans indicating that the contractor should verify the cover remaining over the existing 6" water main south of the proposed 24" bypass storm sewer and that the contractor shall contact the Monee Public Works Department with the proposed amount of cover provided. The water main shall be lowered accordingly if necessary.
28. Include overland flood route sizing calculations. Overland flow paths should carry the 100-year design flow (critical duration) and should carry a minimum of one cfs per tributary acre. The new buildings need to be elevated to at least one foot above the 100-year design elevation. Show overland flow arrows along all the overland flow paths, including between the buildings and along the north drive. Where will the water along the north side of the development overflow? A curb depression may be required near the inlet at the proposed low spot to ensure that the overland flood routing is conveyed to the detention facility and not off-site to the north.
29. As indicated in the enclosed aerial, the southeast corner of the existing paved area seems to be holding water.
30. The existing detention facility emergency overflow weir should be analyzed for flow conveyance and modified accordingly if necessary.
31. As indicated in the enclosed aerial, the detention pond outfall near the north property line is silted in and overgrown with vegetation. This should be addressed accordingly.
32. Please provide an inundation map.
33. The off-site drainage flows from the east of the development should be determined and the proposed drainage pattern demonstrated. It should be verified that the proposed development will not negatively impact the drainage of off-site property owners.
34. The maximum grade behind the proposed curb and gutter should be 4:1. The proposed top of curb elevation should be consider in determining the proposed contours. Please note that it's recommended that a 2' flat area be provided behind the curb where the ground slopes down behind the proposed curb and gutter.
35. The contractor shall locate all existing water valves, fire hydrant auxiliary valves, and fire hydrants and adjust accordingly. The Monee Public Works Department shall be contacted to verify that all valves can be "keyed". These shall be indicated on the plans accordingly.

## Computers, Printers, Cell Phones, Fax Machines - Erase the Memory on these Devices

Computers often contain highly personal information from bank data to tax records. Before donating your computer or bringing it to a recycling program of any kind, clean the hard drive.

Reformat the hard drive or purchase a program that writes over the hard drive. The process can be slow, because such a program writes to the disk repeatedly. Prepare to run it overnight.

It is the duty of the user of any recycling program to ensure data erasure. Will County assumes no responsibility to protect any electronic data remaining in electronics deposited in the electronic recycling program. If you need more detailed instructions e-mail or call the County Land Use - Resource Recovery & Energy offices.

When utilizing a Will County Drop-Off or Collection Event, please be assured that the contracted electronic recycling company cleans the hard drives of all types of computers with Department of Defense approved software.

If the hard drive is damaged and cannot be cleaned with software, it is wiped clean with a magnet and shredded for recycling.

### Front-Door Service Option

If your Television is too large to bring to one of the collection sites, A-Team Recyclers offers collection service for \$40. Please call to make an appointment 815-630-4308. For each Television taken, the company will take up to 9 additional non-TV electronic items.

## Some History:

- In 2000 Will County offered our first one-day electronic item collection event. They were held annually thereafter.
- Since 2007 Will County has offered several free-of-charge year-round drop-offs in partnership with other units of local government. (4 sites in 2007, 11 in 2009, 13 from 2012-2015)
- On April 1, 2011, Will County began offering a pilot **FREE Front-Door Collection** of Electronics to ALL residents of Aurora, Bolingbrook, Crest Hill, Channahon, Elwood, Homer Glen, Joliet, Lemont, Lockport, Minooka, Naperville, New Lenox, Plainfield, Rockdale, Romeoville, Shorewood and Woodridge.
- Front-Door Service expanded to Braceville, Braidwood, Coal City, Diamond, Godley, Manhattan, Symerton and Wilmington September 1, 2011.
- Front-Door service expansion was completed on November 15, 2011, with the addition of Beecher, Crete, Frankfort, Mokena, Monee, Orland Park, Park Forest, Peotone, Sauk Village, Steger, Tinley Park and University Park.
- **As of January 1, 2012 the following items were banned from disposal** in Illinois: Televisions, Monitors, Printers, Computers (Desktops, Laptops, Notebooks, Tablets), Electronic Keyboards, Fax Machines, Videocassette Recorders, Portable Digital Music Players, DVD Players, DVD Recorders, Video Game Consoles, Small Scale Servers, Scanners, Electronic Mice, Digital Converter Boxes, Cable Receivers, Satellite Receivers, Cell Phones, Computer Cable, Portable Digital Assistants (PDAs) and Zip Drives.
- As of May 1, 2014 the Front-Door Collection implemented a fee for service of \$25 per service call.
- From February 1 through February 28, 2016, all the permanent sites closed as our contractor canceled the contract due to the loss of manufacturer funding.
- As of February 12, 2016 the Front Door Collection Contract ended. Vintage Tech/Kuusakowski began charging \$75.
- As of May 3, 2016 the permanent program re-started with the opening of the Lockport Public Works Drop-off.
- July 20, 2016 Peotone Police Department opened a recurring recycling recycling program with us, twice a month, 5pm-7pm
- New Lenox Township reopened in July 2016 with the two-hour, twice a month program.
- Romeoville was able to open a new location in August of 2016 offering the two-hour, twice a month program.
- The City of Joliet partnered with Will County to offer the two-hour, twice a month program in October of 2016, ended in February of 2018 after adding service through their hauler.
- Channahon Township, in partnership with Families of Faith Church, began to offer recurring events in June 2017. The Township built a new garage and relocated the twice a month Electronics program to the new site as of May, 2019.
- The City of Wilmington began partnering with Will County to offer twice a month collection events in July 2017.
- Frankfort Township began offering residential Electronics Recycling Drop-Off service twice a month as a partner in March 2018.
- Additional efforts are being made to offer more sites, as well as offer one-day events.

### Motto: Anything With A Computer Chip WILL Fit

Will County's electronic program protects Will County water and air resources, while reducing the materials going to local landfills. Some computers have a shelf life of only 3 to 5 years. It is often less expensive to purchase a new electronic item instead of repairing it. This increases the amount of waste generated and increases the amount of natural resources needed to make new products.

The EPA states that electronics contain hazardous materials, such as lead, mercury, and hexavalent chromium, batteries and color cathode ray tubes (CRTs). Televisions and CRT monitors contain an average of 4 lbs of lead (depending on size). Mercury from electronics has been cited as a leading source of mercury in municipal waste. Lastly, brominat

ed flame retardants are commonly added to plastics used in electronics. If discarded, these toxins can be released into the environment through landfill leachate.

Worldwide, an estimated 20-50 million tons of electronic waste is generated annually, and an estimated 85% of it ends up in landfills. Recycling electronics avoids air, water and land pollution. It reduces the need to extract valuable and limited resources from the

earth. It also reduces the energy and other resources used in new product manufacturing. Many of the components recovered can be used in new items.

### Electronic Drop-Off Instructions and Locations:

- Bring only residentially generated electronic items. No business electronics can be taken. Businesses are encouraged to call Will County or go to their website for recycling/reuse information.
- Clean off any personal information on hard drives (Reformatting the hard drive or rewriting the disc is recommended.)
- **Take materials to the drop-off ONLY during operational hours.**
- Please place materials carefully in boxes as indicated by signs at the site.
- NO Batteries (please remove batteries before dropping items off at the site)
- NO Packaging (please do not place items back in their original packaging, items should be free of all packaging)
- DO NOT TAKE any items that have already been dropped off. Once items have been placed in the box they are part of the Recycling Program.

## Summary of Household Hazardous Disposal:

- Every home has hazardous waste. Whenever a cleaner or maintenance item is unwanted, it is hazardous waste.
- Will County offers one-day collections and helps fund a permanent collection site.
- Some items may also be taken to retail outlets for proper disposal and recycling services.

Will County partners with some libraries and promotes some retailers to bring residents options for proper battery disposal. Click [Batteries](#) for details.

Will County Land Use Department, Resource Recovery and Energy Division partners with the Forest Preserve District of Will County to offer compact fluorescent lights (CFLs) recycling. Some retailers also offer this service, click [Compact Fluorescent Lights \(CFLS\)](#) for details.

The EPA ceased to recognize latex paint as hazardous in 2000 and it ceased to be accepted in HHW programs. Today, Will County promotes a paint recycling program offered by some retailers. For a full list of options, click [Latex Paint](#) for details.

Will County partners with some pharmacies, the Illinois EPA and several police department to offer year round medication disposable opportunities. For a full list of options, click [Medication](#) for details.



### A Few Helpful Tips:

- Avoid products that may become hazardous waste
- Think before you buy
- Buy the least hazardous product that will do the job, such as low VOC paint. For items that cannot be fully used, safely store until the next Household Hazardous Waste Collection or bring to a permanent site for disposal.
- Read the label of the products that qualify as nontoxic, they may still contain hazardous ingredients in smaller amounts.
- Check for health warnings.
- You may wish to avoid aerosol products. In the use of an aerosol product, tiny droplets can be deeply inhaled and absorbed into the bloodstream.
- Check out the County's [ABC's of Cleaning Alternatives brochure](#) for more ideas.



### Use Products Safely

- Use hazardous products safely by paying attention to proper use instructions.
- Mixing products can cause explosive or poisonous chemical reactions, products may contain incompatible ingredients that may react when mixed.
- Do not eat, drink, smoke, or wear soft contacts while using hazardous products.
- Use in well ventilated area.
- Use protective gloves, goggles and respirators that are appropriate for the task.

### Hazardous Chemical Storage

- Keep out of the reach of children and animals.
- Make sure they are sealed correctly.
- Do not store near food.
- Keep away from heat, flame, switches, motors and ignition areas.
- Store volatile chemicals in a well ventilated area.

- Never store contaminated rags near hazardous products.
- Keep item specific fire extinguishers near vicinity and check charge level regularly.
- Check containers regularly to insure they are dry and not corroding.

Paint - Oil-based ONLY (Latex paint is not considered hazardous, but is not accepted in liquid form by waste haulers. This may be dried and hardened for disposal, see [Latex](#))

### Temporary Restrictions Ending by Nov 1, 2022

Due to a fire at the Illinois EPA's contractor's waste processing plant, there were some temporary restrictions on items accepted at the regional permanent sites from August 1 through October, 2022. Throughout the timeframe, they continued to accept:

- automotive fluids
- extinguishers
- flammables: gasoline, kerosene, oil, transmission fluid, anti-freeze (think of things in a garage)
- fluorescent bulbs, CFL bulbs
- paints and stains (oil-based only)
- peanut oil (cooking oils)
- prescription and over the counter meds
- propane tanks
- solvents and strippers
- thermostats
- mercury
- automotive (lead acid) batteries
